Curriculum Updates

After years of reviewing essential knowledge and skills needed to become an excellent SLP, we finally initiated curriculum changes to our Master's in Speech Language Pathology. Here are just a few of the highlights.

New Topics Course - Core Functions for SLP

Dr Cindy Gevarter secured funding to develop this topics course for Fall of 2024. The college is going to fund the development of this course in hopes of using it to support this need in other departments. The course will focus on the practical aspects of being a SLP therapist, both as a student and as a professional.

New Bilingual Concentration Course - Bilingual Assessment and InterventionDr Irizarry-Perez has updated this course for a Bilingual certificate.

Counseling in Communication Disorders - SHS 509

This is a graduate-level course in counseling taught by Clinical Instructor Lauril Sachet. Specific focus will be on counseling individuals and families about communication and swallowing disorders/differences. It will be offered in the Spring Semester.

Assessment and Intervention for Children with Speech Sound Disorders - SHS 508

This is a graduate level course taught by Assistant Professor Carlos Irizarry-Perez that will address normal and disordered patterns of speech development, methods of analyzing data, and principles of assessment and treatment of speech sound disorders.

Much of her research centered on characterizing aspects of speech intelligibility and determining best practice for evaluation and management of individuals with motor speech disorders. Some of her recent work focuses on identifying acoustic biomarkers for early detection of chronic traumatic encephalopathy and helping characterize the speech patterns of rare diseases such as oculopharyngeal muscular dystrophy and Pompe

Disease. Throughout her scholarship, she has engaged students in her research. One student noted that Amy "infected me with the skill of critical thinking and understanding and I will forever be grateful for catching such a disease."

MEASURING AIDED LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT

- This is a 5-year, multi-site project in collaboration with the University of Central Florida (with Principal Investigator Jennifer Kent-Walsh and Project Manager Nancy Harrington) and the University of Wisconsin- Milwaukee (with Co-investigator John Heilmann).
- The project focuses on developing ways to measure the language development of children who use augmentative and alternative communication (AAC); that is, children who rely on picture symbols to communicate because they have significant speech impairments. Children involved in the study have impairments such as cerebral palsy, Down syndrome, and a disorder called childhood apraxia of speech.

Dolores S. and Paul L. Butt Comunidad Crecer Fund



This year's annual visit to Comunidad Crecer will take place between May 26th and June 2nd. SHS Clinical Instructor Andrea Martinez-Fisher will be traveling with SHS Graduate students Sophia Flanders (2023), Ayita Berhane (2023) and Elizabeth Arellano (2023) to provide SLP services to the local community. This annual service trip is entirely funded by the students throughout the year via various fundraising activities.,

SHS has been travelling to Comunidad Crecer since it was started in 1990 by Dr. Dolores Butt. Dr Butt's son, Allen Butt, shared the following memory from his father, Paul Butt.



I am sure you know that Comunidad Crecer means a place to grow; what is not known is how the connection between Dolores and the school in Mexico City was formed. In Mexico in the 1990s, the law prohibited parents from taking their handicapped children to any movie theater, restaurant or other public facility. There were no schools for such children and so Gare DeZaldo, the mother of a son with cerebral palsy, started her own school. She tried many different ways to get help from United States teachers but was unsuccessful. Finally, she called a friend, the head of the American Red Cross in Houston, and asked her if she knew anyone who was a teacher working with handicapped children. The friend said yes, I was at a convention recently and Dolores Butt spoke on how to teach handicapped children to communicate

Gare did call one December day, and after several more conversations, Dolores and I were on our way to Mexico City. There the plans were made to take Dolores' students to Comunidad Crecer, and to work with both the teachers and students at Crecer. Dolores managed to get grant money, donations, and services of medical doctors, PTs and OTs for the annual trips to Mexico City, along with 12 or so of her Master's Candidates.



One of the first students to participate, Sheri Armendariz, shared a memory with us recently.



I remember getting to Comunidad Crecer in the late afternoon. When we got there, they had a meal prepared for us and gave all of us a necklace with a small terra-cotta cup on it. These were for tequila shots. The evening was filled with music from the mariachi band, food and mimes completed by Dr. Butt, Chris Brown, Linda Ross, and one of the tutors from the school. I included pictures from that evening. Much of our time there, that I recall, was working with the children on the computer and assessing their different abilities and language, communication, and cognition. We also had a physical therapist and a physical therapy student there who assessed their physical abilities as well. Our days were full as each child was assessed in each area. We also spent time training the teachers from the school and using the computer and low tech AAC. I included picture where Dr. Butt is talking to the parents about what we were trying to do for the children and what things we were looking at.

After our work was done, the evenings were spent eating lots of delicious food and we went on a few field trips. We went to see the large Mayan ruins, the large pyramids outside of Mexico City and went on a canal boat ride.









The students and faculty have been raising funds all year to support their trip. On March 20th, Kelly Jo Designs (KELLYJODESIGNSbyWine.com), hosted a wine and paint night with proceeds supporting the student's costs. \$660.00 was raised, the largest fundraiser Kelly Jo Designs has hosted to date!
